





How the Presidents Stack Up Truman became president after Franklin D. Roosevelt died at the start of his fourth term.





How the Presidents Stack Up After a major heart attack in the fall of 1955, Eisenhower was elected to a second term a year later.






How the Presidents Stack Up Inheritor of the war in Vietnam, Johnson was unable to improve upon his inaugural highs.






How the Presidents Stack Up Appointed Nixon's vice president after Spiro Agnew's resignation, Ford finished Nixon's term.






How the Presidents Stack Up Carter made progress with the Camp David Accords, but the Iran hostage crisis ultimately hurt him




How the Presidents Stack Up Reagan survived two major downturns, during a recession and after Iran-Contra.




How the Presidents Stack Up A reversal of his "No New Taxes" vow hurt George H.W. Bush, but the Gulf War was a diversion.
